You're invited to a virtual film screening of the rarely-seen documentary *King: A Filmed Record...Montgomery to Memphis*, including the special guest for the afternoon: actor and activist Danny Glover.

This fundraising event will help us send our 20-member delegation to the national PPC Moral Poverty Action Congress on June 19. Activists from across the country will head to Washington D.C. for a three-day gathering that will include panels, workshops, trainings and opportunities to meet with and learn from other states' PPC campaigners, with the aim of strengthening our capacity across the country. It's a continuation of our work of building power to change policies that are hurting the nation's 140 million poor and low-income people.

Here's why delegate Miracle Law-White wants to go to the Moral Congress:

I have been active in the Laney College chapter of the Poor People's Campaign and have participated in teach-ins and other events advocating for unhoused students. I have first-hand experience with homelessness and I want to be an advocate for

others....There are almost no resources or policies benefiting homeless students and people who are involved in their community. There are supposedly "scarce" resources for poor students but there is an abundance of wealth in the United States.

"No Evictions on Stolen Land!" L.A. activists rally for homelessness prevention On Tuesday, LA PPC activists joined community members and faith leaders from many denominations on the steps of Pasadena City Hall for a "Home is Sacred" rally to support state bill SB 567, the Homelessness Prevention Act. This bill would provide many tenant and eviction protections—but amendments have been made and the bill has stalled in the Senate Appropriations Committee. The action was organized by LA Voice to deliver an urgent message to State Senator Anthony Portantino, chair of the Appropriations Committee: Support the bill in its original form and shepherd it through the committee and to the Senate floor.

The spirit-filled crowd continued on to the First Baptist Church of Pasadena, where they phoned Portantino's office, heard testimonies from impacted people and were treated to music by Urban Voices Project. Their rallying cry of the day was, "There should be no evictions on stolen land!"

Update: Affordable housing fight for Peralta Community College District students

At a recent Peralta Board of Trustees meeting, student government representative and Laney PPC member Jon Sullivan asked the board to build 2,000 additional housing units (the district plans for 200–300), partner with land trusts to buy hotels and open student cooperatives. "I live in my vehicle, and I go to school here," he told the board, adding that more housing for families must be high among the priorities, given many students have dependents. Dorm location is also a sticking point, and low-income students asked for additional resources, including transportation, social services and crisis resources.

"The Poor People's Campaign Launched on Mother's Day 2018"

In an op-ed published last Sunday by <u>The Nation</u>, Bishop Barber and Rev. Theoharis acknowledged the fifth anniversary of the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival. They reflected on the movement's major milestones, recommited to the work ahead and laid out the connections between the PPC and the special day on which it was launched:

We remember mothers of the movement like Rachel in the Bible, who refused to stop her protest in the face of evil leaders. We remember Mother Jones, who declared, "You ought to be out raising hell. This is the fighting age. Put on your fighting clothes." And as all the mothers in the movement get up every day saying "no" to reality as it is and

declaring, as mother and grandmother Yara Allen says, "Somebody's hurting our people and it's gone on far too long and we won't be silent anymore."
