
Tell Congress to honor veterans, commit to ending poverty and cosponsor House Resolution 532!

The military budget, which is 62 percent of U.S. discretionary spending, has devastating consequences for people in this country and around the globe. On Veteran's Day, let us honor those in the campaign who are veterans and members of military families with a call for a Third Reconstruction, which would redirect military spending to address the needs of the 140 million poor and low-wealth Americans. [H.Res.532](#) calls upon Congress to demilitarize U.S. foreign policy, reduce the Pentagon's budget, end "forever wars," choose diplomacy over aggression and more.



To highlight on Veteran's Day the impact of militarism and the war economy, we are lifting up Dr. King's prophetic speech "Beyond Vietnam: A Time to Break Silence." We have given public readings of the speech for the last two years. Listen to the April 4, 2023 statewide reading [here](#).

Striking hotel workers have been met with violence by hotel security, while unhoused migrant workers have been brought in to replace them during the strikes. This truth commission hearing will give you the opportunity to hear testimonies from workers and migrants who have been affected and exploited during the ongoing labor dispute, and to show your solidarity as their struggle continues.

Le Méridien Delfina sees biggest protest yet

The March for Migrants protest in Santa Monica last Saturday drew a strong and loud crowd of supporters, including CA PPC members and partners, who shared their experiences and photos on social media. After picketing at Le Méridien Delfina and the

Viceroy, the gathering headed onto the Santa Monica pier to bring the message to the public. Marchers called on the hotel to come to an agreement on a fair increase in wages and to stop its reported practices of using vulnerable migrants as laborers—and paying them less—during the strike. “Roses Dressed in Black”

Writing in [TomDispatch](#), Rev. Theoharis lays out a few of the many absurdities that define our military priorities. Here’s one: “At a moment when the Republicans (and some Democrats) argue that we can’t afford universal healthcare or genuine living wages, the military budget for 2023 is \$858 billion and the Pentagon still maintains 750 military bases globally.” At the same time, she recognizes the many Americans who are beginning to question these priorities—and she uplifts the “eruption of nonviolent, propeace protests across the world.”

“We must stop the killing”

In a long [Twitter thread](#) posted over the weekend, Bishop Barber spoke of a growing, multifaith chorus calling for a ceasefire in Gaza. Acknowledging both the atrocities of October 7 and the “indiscriminate violence” taking place at the hands of the Netanyahu administration, he wrote, “I want to be w/ the beloved community that’s against antisemitism & Islamophobia, that loves the Jewish child & the Muslim child; the Black poor, the white poor, the Latino poor, the Asian poor, & the Native poor; people of faith & not of faith; gay, straight, trans & nonbinary.” Read the whole thread [here](#).
