





Workshop: War Tax Resistance 101

Since the violence erupted in Israel and Gaza, the [National War Tax Resistance Coordinating Committee](#) office has been inundated with requests for information and more online War Tax Resistance 101 workshops. They have since streamed two

introduction sessions that were each attended by over 150 individuals and viewed by hundreds more on [YouTube](#). Their [TikTok page](#) offers short videos on different aspects of war tax resistance; in the last month, the videos have received over 130,000 views.

Nearly half of U.S. tax dollars are directed to past and present military expenses, and the U.S. provides over \$3 billion in military support to Israel each year. If you would like to stop paying for this, we invite you to join the upcoming session. The first 30 minutes will cover the basics of war tax resistance, followed by plenty of time for Q&A. The session will also examine the actual risks of war tax resistance, including the risks associated with different methods. It will not be recorded.

The PPC turns 56: picking up Dr. King's campaign

Commemorating the 56th anniversary of the Poor People's Campaign, launched on December 4, 1967 by a coalition that included Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., two articles share important lessons from the early years, as well as the efforts we carry on today.

[TruthDig](#) covered the PPC's origins and Bishop Barber and Rev. Theoharis's revitalization of the campaign five years ago. Stunning photos of the movement are featured alongside links to a photo essay and our 2023 fact sheets.

The article quotes remarks made by Bishop Barber upon the release of the [fact sheets](#): “The facts show that poverty is devastating, deadly, and cannot be denied as a major domestic problem that’s creating an impoverished democracy. We are determined to push it to the forefront of Americans’ public policy agenda of change. We can’t and we won’t be silent about this crisis anymore.”

In the nonprofit news outlet [MLK50: Justice through Journalism](#), executive editor Adrienne Johnson Martin recalls some of the lesser-known moments in PPC history and thinks critically about what is needed in the year ahead. She writes that the campaign might have been “King’s most difficult and dangerous plan because it sought to unite all the poor, regardless of race, which means it was uniting the most vulnerable against the most powerful.”

Freedom Church of the Poor's "Winter Offensive" marches on

On Sunday, Rev. Theoharis shared the [live broadcast](#) of the latest Freedom Church of the Poor's Advent of a Revolution / Winter Offensive service, titled "Hope is a four-letter word." The Freedom Church of the Poor, together with partners from various fronts, are using nine Sundays from Thanksgiving to MLK Day to hold a spiritual space of prayer, song, learning and community for our movement leaders.

They will use this time to invite in new leaders and organizations to share their insights and experiences, to get organized and to continue to unite the poor across lines of division. They will lift up the true revolutionary power of the story told during this season: the birth of a poor brown-skinned Palestinian Jewish leader from the backwaters of empire who helped bring "down the mighty from their thrones" and revealed a new way of peace—one rooted in truth, justice, and love.

“What pro-democracy activists can learn from their adversaries”

With the next election less than a year away, and in the face of rising Christian nationalism, Rev. Theoharis and Rahna Epting, executive director of MoveOn, wrote an opinion piece in [The Chronicle of Philanthropy](#) reminding pro-democracy activists to pay more attention to the strategy and tactics employed by those gaining momentum.

In particular, they argue that we must learn from the patient, persistent groundwork of so many who have been winning local elections, which has amounted to a major political party becoming the anti-democratic MAGA party.

“To better understand the movement’s success, we conferred with organizers, faith leaders, journalists, academics, and people across the political spectrum,” they write. “We found that white Christian nationalist organizations are growing in no small part because they’ve made community-building and meeting people’s everyday material and spiritual needs a priority.”

In discussing the path forward, they highlight many pro-democracy philanthropic organizations doing critical community outreach and important movement-building work. They encourage us all to understand the realities and needs of those who are open and ready to join forces with us in order to save our democracy.
